Planning for the Future

In January the Canton Public Library embarked on a strategic planning process to help us determine what we will focus on for the next three years. With dwindling dollars and challenging economic times, we need your input to help us decide what we should spend your money on and how to best serve your needs.

To that end, your input is invaluable. We are seeking your feedback and have set up a variety of ways to collect it. On our website, www.cantonpl.org, you can click on the Strategic Plan link in the right column to leave your thoughts and read what other people have posted. We have special Strategic Plan comment cards at the Reception and Reference Desks. You may also post comments on our Twitter and Facebook accounts. And yes, we welcome and encourage face-to-face conversations with library staff.

To follow our progress, keep an eye on our website, read the brightboard display in the Children's Department and by the Checkout Desk, check the newsletter or just ask. This process will help us determine what our community wants and needs from a library and we will continue to work hard to meet those needs.

Greening Up

The library has instituted several environmentally friendly initiatives in the last year. We debuted our Abitibi paper recycling containers, switched to reusable canvas tote bags, converted to rechargeable batteries for some digital media (see page 2 for details), and started collecting electronics and printer cartridges for recycling.

To reflect your growing interest in ways to be more environmentally responsible, we also added materials to the collection on the subjects of environment and saving energy, including a kill-a-watt energy meter that measures the energy use of appliances. Our magazine collection has expanded to include titles like *Organic Gardening*, *National Geographic's Green Guide*, *Mother Earth News* and *Back Home*. We also added a Green Resources section to our website.

Power Up Your Playaway With Rechargeable Batteries

Playaway audio MP3s are now supplied with rechargeable batteries. This reduces the money spent buying batteries and is more environmentally friendly. Before you use the Playaway, follow the included instructions to install the battery and when you return the device, leave the battery inside. If you have any questions, or need help installing the battery, just ask. A \$3 replacement fee will be charged to your account if you don't return the rechargeable battery.

The Library Comes to You With Books by Mail

Are you a Canton resident who is physically unable to come to the library due to a permanent or long-time illness or disability, or over 65 years old without a way to get to the library? Try our Books by Mail service. Every four weeks, four books will be delivered to your home, postage free. When you've finished the books, return them in the mailing pouch. Postage is already paid.

To participate, just fill out a Books by Mail application, available at the Reference Desk, by mail, or online at www.cantonpl.org.

Save Some Green With Financial Aid Information

Paying for college means earning scholarships, saving in advance, taking advantage of payment plans and applying for financial aid through the government. When comparing costs of colleges, be sure to compare the per credit hour rate so you're accurately comparing apples to apples. At some schools, the more credit hours you take, the lower the tuition rate so you save money overall.

Some tips: pay attention to deadlines, attend any financial aid workshops offered and use the online FAFSA4caster at www.fafsa4caster.ed.gov to learn about the financial aid process and get an early estimate of your eligibility for federal student aid.
