It's Bigger and Better than Ever!

This year's Everyone's Reading...Metro Book Club features author Elizabeth McCracken and her three books:

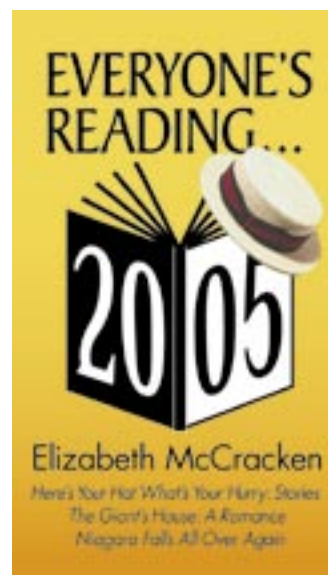
- Here's Your Hat What's Your Hurry: Stories*
- The Giant's House: A Romance*
- Niagara Falls All Over Again*

This is the first year the popular reading program has featured multiple books by an author. Readers and critics have praised McCracken as a fresh voice in fiction whose writing offers offbeat but endearing characters, snappy dialogue and seamless plots. McCracken — who was recognized by *Granta* magazine as one of the twenty "Best American Novelists" under 40 — is a National Book Award finalist. She has won the Barnes & Noble "Discover Great New Writers Award" and an award from the American Library Association for "Notable Book of the Year."

Everyone's Reading Elizabeth McCracken features programs and special events at the Canton Public Library, including a super-sized Lunch and a Book at 12 noon on **Thursday, March 10** that covers all three McCracken books, and during National Library Week Elizabeth McCracken will speak and sign books in the library's Community Room. This reservation-only event on **Wednesday, April 13** at 7 p.m. is free and we expect a full house so please register early. We will begin accepting registrations on Friday, April 1 by calling (734) 397-0999 or in person at the library.

Everyone's Reading...is a community-wide reading event sponsored by the Metro Net Library Consortium, which includes the Canton Public Library. Similar to the One Book, One Community programs across the country, Everyone's Reading promotes reading and discussion by encouraging an entire community to read and discuss the same books.

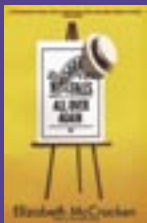

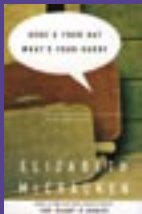

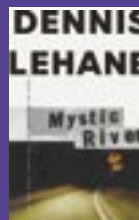

After the Death of Anna Gonzales by Terri Fields — Poems written in the voices of 47 people, including students, teachers and other school staff, record the aftermath of a high school student's suicide and the preoccupations of teen life.

The Taking of Room 114: A Hostage Drama in Poems by Mel Glenn — This series of poems reflects the thoughts of school officials, parents, police, and especially a class of seniors who have been taken hostage by their high school history teacher.

Poems from Homeroom: A Writer's Place to Start by Kathi Appelt — A collection of poems about the experiences of young people. There's also a section with information about how each poem was written that helps readers create their own verse.

First Grade Round Up

National TV Turn Off Week (April 25 - May 1, 2005)

TV-Turnoff Week 2005 reminds us all to put down the remote control and pick up books. Many years ago, before television, reading was a national pastime. Now, on average, children spend over four hours a day in front of the TV, and this year will spend more time watching television (1,023 hours) than in school (900 hours).

Why not take this opportunity to show your family the importance of reading? Here are a few simple things that parents can do to create a healthy reading environment. Turn off your television and start reading!

- *Make Reading Materials Available* — Reading materials should be part of your home and everyday life. Have a supply of books as well as magazines, newspapers and catalogs. Make sure that these materials are inviting to everyone and accessible to children of all ages.
- *Be a Role Model* — Children love to imitate others. If they see you reading daily for pleasure they will want to read like you.
- *Read Aloud to Children* — Reading to children encourages a positive attitude toward books. Children who are read to at home learn to read more easily, have a higher vocabulary, and are more likely to develop a love for reading than those who are not read to on a regular basis.
- *Visit the Library* — Bring the kids to the library and together find the many treasures waiting to be discovered.

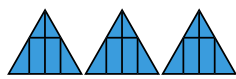
