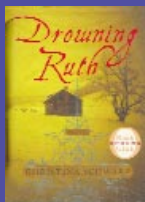

### Evening Book Discussions

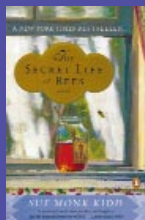
#### November 15 at 7 p.m.

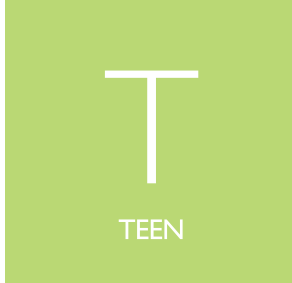

### Internet Classes

#### Mouse Skills

**November 5 & December 17,** 10-11 a.m.

If you have never used a computer mouse before, this beginners-only class will guide you in mastering basic skills.

#### Internet I

**November 6 & December 3,** 10-11 a.m.

This class focuses on the basic features of Internet Explorer. Prerequisite: Mouse Skills or equivalent.

#### Internet II

**November 18, 7-8 p.m. & December 10,** 10-11 a.m.

Unearth a wealth of information by learning to search on the Web, the Library's catalog, and online databases. Prerequisite: Internet I.

#### MS Word — Beginning

**November 13 & December 4,** 9:30-11 a.m.

This class covers formatting text and documents, saving and opening documents, and using clip art. Prerequisite: Mouse and keyboard proficiency.

#### MS Word — Intermediate

**November 20 & December 11,** 9:30-11 a.m.

Learn about tables, bullets, headers and footers, and WordArt. Prerequisite: MS Word (Beginning) or equivalent.

#### Power Searching

**November 19,** 10-11 a.m.

Learn how to Power Search, in one single step, the Library's catalog and multiple databases, then filter and sort the results. Prerequisite: Internet I or equivalent.

## Intensify your Research: Power Search

The next time you need to locate a specific piece of information, try out the Canton Public Library's Power Search tool. This smart research assistant allows you to simultaneously search online databases and library catalogs, filter, sort and save the results, and then connect directly to the resource. Within seconds your search scans through millions of records and presents you with direct links to the information you need.

While this technology may seem similar to the search capabilities of Google or Yahoo, the library's Power Search gives you access to exclusive databases that a Google search can't provide. As a Canton Public Library card-holder you have access privileges to full-text articles from magazines and newspapers, world-wide library catalogs, databases of poems and literature, referrals to Canton-specific services, and so much more.

To begin a Power Search click on the Library Catalog link at [www.cantonpl.org](http://www.cantonpl.org) and select a simple or advanced search. You will have the option to enter a specific word or phrase to search for, or pinpoint your research by combining multiple terms. To learn more about this essential research tool, plan to attend the new Power Searching class on November 19 (see Internet Classes for details).

Add some intensity to your research, Power Search these databases:

*Business & Company Resource Center:* Detailed company and industry news and information.

*General BusinessFile ASAP:* Full-text articles from business periodicals.

*Everything Canton:* Links to services and resources in the Canton area.

*Opposing Viewpoints:* Social issues from varying perspectives.

*History Reference Center:* U.S. and world history information.

*Encyclopedia Americana:* Online version of the standard print encyclopedia.

*Health Reference Center Academic:* Articles on a wide range of health related topics.

*WorldCat:* Catalog of books and other materials in libraries worldwide.

*Literature Resource Center:* Biographies, bibliographies, and critical analysis of authors.

*LitFinder:* Full-text stories, essays and poems.

*Electric Library:* Newspapers, magazines, transcripts, pictures and maps.

*General Reference Center Gold:* Magazines, newspapers, and reference books.

*SIRS Researcher:* Articles on social, economic, and political issues.

## Canton Public Library Endowment Fund

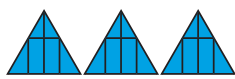
